<p>Supporting Documents to be Included with Application Form</p>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Official proof of English proficiency (TOEFL, IELTS, CAEL or CEFR). The test report must be in English and the test date cannot be more than 24 months prior to application • Most recent official transcript <u>translated into English</u> with the Home Institution's <u>Grading System</u> • In order of priority, a list of ten (10) Carleton courses the student would like to be registered in, including course titles and course codes.

Course Selection:	Course availability is subject to change. For exchange term(s) at Carleton, students should create a study plan that includes a <u>mixture of courses</u> from their major, minor, concentration and most especially electives. <u>Students are advised not to request courses that they need for graduation purposes because we cannot guarantee we will be able to accommodate their request.</u> The courses listed on an Incoming Exchange Application form will be reviewed by Carleton’s departmental advisors. If courses have been selected from more than one discipline, a request will be sent to the designated department contact for each discipline.

	<p>Our academic departments will determine which courses an exchange student is approved to take.</p> <p>NOTE: A student may not be approved to take all of the courses they have requested on their application. This can be due to a number of factors, including but not limited to: course is restricted and not open to exchange students, course is full, course is not offered in correct exchange term, course is cancelled, course conflicts with other registered courses or the student does not meet the academic prerequisites to take the course.</p>

Mandatory Fees

Health Insurance (UHIP):	<p>UHIP: All students are required to enroll in the <u>mandatory</u> University Health Insurance Plan (UHIP).</p> <p><u>UHIP</u> covers <u>basic medical care</u>. Visa Information

You do not need a study permit if your studies in Canada will be less than 6 months.

If your studies are more than 6 months, you need a study permit. Application instructions for a study permit are available at the website of Immigration, Refugees, and Citizenship Canada: <https://www.canada.ca/en/immigration-refugees-citizenship/services/study-canada/study-permit.html>. Your acceptance letter from Carleton will be part of the documentation you include with your study permit application. You will also need to provide Carleton’s Designated Learning Institution number, which is listed at top of this letter (note: the first digit is the letter “O”).

Most international students need a Temporary Resident Visa (TRV) or Electronic Travel Authorization (eTA) to travel to Canada.

- If you apply for a study permit, your TRV or eTA will be issued to you automatically
- If you don’t need a study permit, check to see if you need a TRV or an eTA here: <http://www.cic.gc.ca/english/visit/visas.asp> . This letter may be used in a TRV application to explain the purpose of your visit to Canada.
